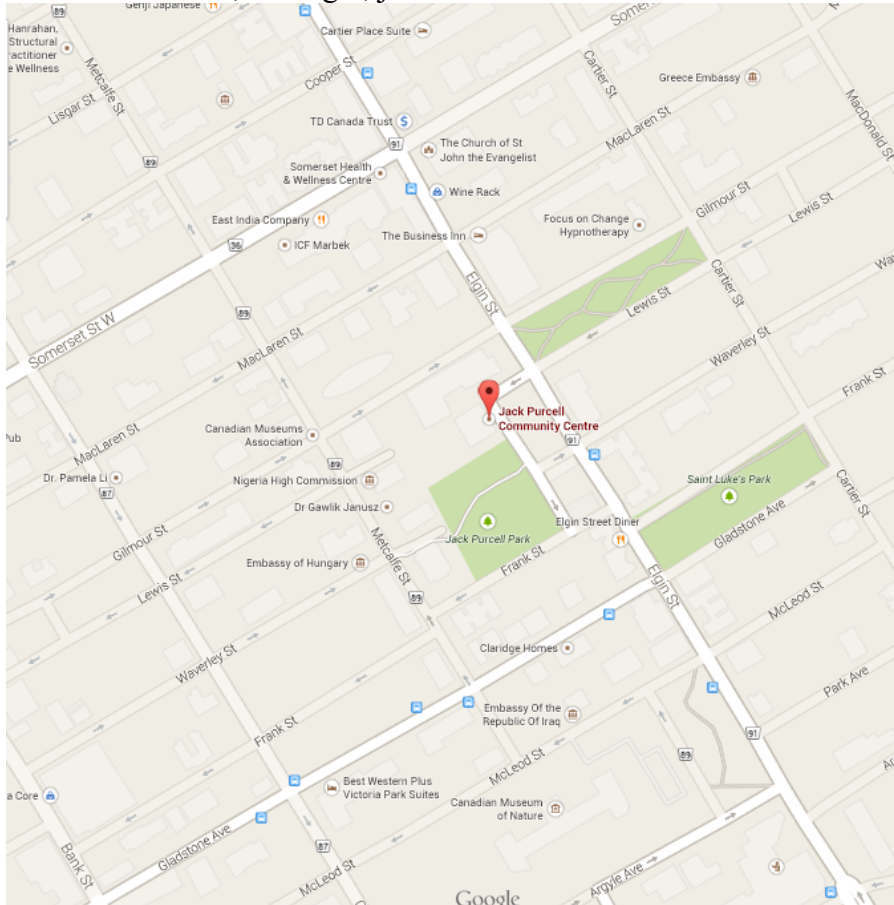




Outline for the 2018 Chirps Tweets and Trills: Learn your local bird songs, with the Ottawa Bird Count

Where? - The course is taking place at the Jack Purcell Community Centre. 320 Jack Purcell Lane, off Elgin, just south of Somerset: **ROOM 203A**



When? – Every Saturday morning from 8:30 – 10:30, March 24th – April 28th. The doors open at 8:30 am sharp, so please try and arrive on time (and we can use a little help setting up chairs ☺).

As the weather warms and the birds return, we will meet before the class some mornings to do some extra field practise; we will decide on those times and locations as the course progresses.

Things to do before course:

Have a look at the lists below and brush-up on your visual identification of these species (don't worry about identifying flycatchers by sight, they're easier by sound ☺).

If you're not already familiar with playing mp3 files on your phone, computer, ipod, or player, ask the nearest member of the under-20 set. They can almost certainly help. I'm not a techno-geek myself so I'm afraid I'm not likely to be much help.

The first week's sound files are attached to this message so you can start to practise.

Things to bring:

Pen/Pencil

Something on which to take notes

Bird Guide (I find it useful to write notes in mine)

Coffee mug (There's a Starbucks, just outside the community centre)

What I hope you'll get out of this? - By the end of the course, **if you practice**, you should be able to instantly recognize the songs of at least the 70 most common species that you will encounter within the Ottawa area. With these skills you will be qualified to adopt an OBBC point count route. The OBBC is a volunteer-based bird survey. Without skilled people like you to conduct the field surveys, our database would not exist.

If the point count routes are not your speed, you can adopt a census plot. These surveys take a bit more time (5 visits per year) but have a more relaxed pace and the observer has a bit more time to double-check their identifications. The survey protocols are on our website (www.ottawabirds.ca).
